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BLACKFEET COMMUNITY COLLEGE FORGIVES MORE THAN \$1.1 MILLION IN STUDENT DEBT TO REDUCE BARRIERS TO HIGHER EDUCATION WITH SCOTT GIFT

The Blackfeet Community College (BFCC) Board of Trustees approved on August 19, 2026, the forgiveness of \$1,167,108.90 in eligible student debt, made possible through the unrestricted gift received from philanthropist MacKenzie Scott. The action provides meaningful financial relief to students while addressing a significant barrier to enrollment and continued educational progress.

The decision comes at a critical time for students and families navigating the rising cost of living. By eliminating eligible outstanding student balances, BFCC is creating an opportunity for students who may have been prevented from registering or continuing their education because of past-due institutional balances to return to the classroom and pursue their academic and career goals.

“This action reflects our commitment to putting students first,” said BFCC President Brad Hall.

“Tribal colleges rarely have unrestricted funding, so when we do, we seek opportunities to address the financial barriers that can stand between our students and their education. This is an investment in our students and in the future of our institution.” The debt forgiveness initiative also reflects BFCC’s approach to responsible stewardship of unrestricted philanthropic support. By resolving eligible outstanding balances, the college can reduce barriers to student reengagement while strengthening its financial position and maintaining resources for continued institutional operations and student services.

The timing of the decision is particularly significant as BFCC prepares for fall registration, August 24–28, 2026. Students who were previously unable to register because of financial holds or outstanding institutional balances are encouraged to reconnect with BFCC and explore their options for returning this fall. Eligible institutional student debt covered by the Board’s action has been automatically forgiven, and students do not need to apply for debt forgiveness or complete any additional paperwork. President Hall emphasized that the Board’s action represents both a commitment to student access and a strategic investment in the college.

“The Board’s decision recognizes the realities our students and families are facing and demonstrates the college’s commitment to strengthening access, opportunity, and student success through key investments that also strengthen the college’s financial position,” Hall said.

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CREATING OPPORTUNITIES: BFCC STUDENTS GAIN HANDS-ON RENEWABLE ENERGY EXPERIENCE

Through workforce training and community partnerships, we are creating opportunities for our students to gain real-world experience and prepare for careers in renewable energy.

We are committed to creating opportunities that allow our students to learn new skills, gain hands-on experience, and prepare for the workforce. Our growing work in renewable energy is one example of how we are connecting education and workforce training to projects that benefit our students, campus, and community.

Through our partnership with Tribal Energy Alternatives (TEA), a GRID Alternatives affiliate, students have had opportunities to participate in solar workforce training and gain hands-on experience with renewable energy projects at BFCC.

Three recent Industry Trades Certificate graduates: Taymond Stiffarm, Landon Carlson, and Lebron Carlson, completed IBT Installation Basics training and put those skills into practice by working on our current solar project.

FROM TRAINING TO HANDS-ON EXPERIENCE

Since 2020, 49 students have participated in IBT Installation Basics and related energy training opportunities. The 2.5-week IBT Installation Basics program provides

students with certifications in OSHA 10 Workplace Safety, First Aid & CPR, and IBT 200.

For us, these opportunities are about more than completing a training program. We want our students to leave BFCC with skills they can use beyond the classroom and experience they can carry with them into their careers.

Taymond, Landon, and Lebron were able to take their IBT training and apply it to a real renewable energy project happening right here on their own campus. They weren't just learning about renewable energy, they were helping build it.

CELEBRATING OUR SOLAR PROJECT

BFCC recently celebrated the continued growth of our renewable energy efforts with a ribbon-cutting ceremony for the solar project.

The ceremony included a blessing from Smokey and Darnell Ridesatthedor and remarks from Tribal Chairman Terry Tasty, who spoke about the history of alternative energy projects at BFCC.

BFCC staff and project partners also shared remarks about the project and its

importance to our students and community. Representing BFCC were Melissa Weatherwax, Felix Nez, Ron Lahr, Dr. Brad Hall, and Cheryl Madman, along with Jan Scott and Talia Martin of Tribal Energy Alternatives.

The celebration recognized not only the solar project itself, but also the partnerships and people who have helped make this work possible.

BUILDING ON OUR RENEWABLE ENERGY FUTURE

BFCC's partnership with TEA began with a U.S. Department of Energy-funded project in 2020, followed by the installation of 53.2 kW of rooftop solar across four BFCC facilities in 2021: Red Fox, Muskrat Lodge, Medicine Shield Fitness, and Little Star Child Care.

In 2023, the partnership expanded into workforce development, creating solar training opportunities for BFCC students. Our 2026 renewable energy project, supported by the Tribal Solar Accelerator Fund (TSAF), continues that work. The project includes a 21.52 kW DC solar garden array and a 2.37 kW DC agrivoltaic pump system that will support the BFCC Extension Student-Led Food Forest Project

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and provide water for our bison.

These projects are helping us turn our campus into a living lab, where students can see renewable energy in action and explore its connections to agriculture, water, science, and workforce development.

INVESTING IN OUR STUDENTS AND OUR FUTURE

Our investment in renewable energy is also an investment in our students.

By bringing together workforce training, hands-on experience, education, and community partnerships, we are creating opportunities for our students to develop skills in an emerging industry while contributing to projects that benefit our campus and community.

For Taymond, Landon, and Lebron, their experience on the solar project provided an opportunity to take classroom and workforce training and turn it into real-world experience.

That is what we strive to provide at BFCC: opportunities for our students to learn, gain experience, and take an active role in building the future of our community.

As we continue expanding our renewable energy projects and workforce training opportunities, we are creating more ways for our students to learn, lead, and prepare for the future, while building a stronger and more sustainable Blackfeet community.

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HONORING OUR HISTORY: 34TH ANNUAL DAYS OF THE PIKANI

Blackfeet Community College will host the 34th annual Days of the Piikani, bringing our community together to share knowledge, stories, teachings, and perspectives.

Blackfeet Community College will host the 34th Annual Days of the Piikani September 22–24, continuing a long-standing tradition of bringing together Piikani knowledge carriers, teachers, students, community members, researchers, and others to share knowledge, stories, teachings, and perspectives. September 22 will be dedicated as Youth Day, providing an opportunity for young people to participate and learn.

This year's theme is "Honoring Ninaista'ko" — Chief Mountain, recognizing the enduring connection between the Piikani people, our lands, and the knowledge carried forward through generations.

As part of this year's gathering, Piikani Studies will share the history of Days of the Piikani, including the vision and contributions of those who helped establish the event: Carol Murray, Marvin Weatherwax Sr., and Redman Little Plume. Their work helped create a gathering where Piikani knowledge, history, culture, and teachings could be shared and honored.

SHARING KNOWLEDGE ACROSS GENERATIONS

This year's Days of the Piikani will feature opportunities to learn about Blackfoot knowledge, language, culture, and our relationship with the land.

Attendees can look forward to Eco Flights, Blackfoot language, and presentations from knowledge holders and scholars from across the Blackfoot Confederacy.

Confirmed presenters include Eldon Weasel Child of Siksika and Dr. Tarissa Spoonhunter of Amskapi Pikanii.

Eldon Weasel Child was born and raised in Siksika, where Blackfoot was his first language. He has spent decades actively involved in Blackfoot cultural and ceremonial life and sharing Blackfoot history, language, and knowledge. He currently serves as a culture, language, and history instructor with Old Sun Community College and other organizations.

Dr. Tarissa Spoonhunter, also known as Nato Ksiksstaki Aki, is of Blackfeet, Arapaho, and Dakota descent. She is the inaugural Lil-



iane and Christian Haub Professor in the Haub School of Environment and Natural Resources at the University of Wyoming and Director of the High Plains American Indian Research Institute.

Her work focuses on traditional ecological knowledge, natural resources, Indigenous education, and creating pathways and opportunities for tribal students. Her presentation is titled "Blackfoot Confederacy Keepers of the Rocky Mountains."

Piikani knowledge carriers, teachers, students, community members, researchers, and others are invited to present on topics connected to Piikani history, culture, language, teachings, research, and perspectives.

Beyond learning about one another's communities, the week encouraged conversations around leadership, service, education, and cross-cultural understanding. Through shared experiences, participants were able to learn from one another and build relationships that extend beyond the classroom.

The visit also strengthened the growing partnership between Blackfeet Community College and Eastern University, creating opportunities for continued collaboration and connection between our students.

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SEPTEMBER AT MEDICINE SPRING LIBRARY

A new semester brings new opportunities to read, create, learn, and connect at Medicine Spring Library.

As the fall semester gets underway, Medicine Spring Library is welcoming students, community members, youth, and elders to a full schedule of activities throughout September.

This fall, the library is offering a variety of programs designed to encourage learning, creativity, and connection. From book discussions and hands-on maker activities to beading and technology classes, there are opportunities for everyone to get involved.

SOMETHING FOR EVERYONE

The library's Book Club is open to everyone, whether you have finished the book, are still reading, or simply want to join the conversation. September's selection is *Python's Kiss* by Louise Erdrich, with the discussion taking place September 17 from 4:30–6 p.m.

The library will also host Maker Fridays throughout the semester. These weekly activities provide a space to work on creative projects, learn new skills, or simply spend time making something. Some Fridays will feature a specific activity, while others will remain open for participants to work on their own projects. September's featured Maker Friday activity will be Beeswax Paper on September 18.

For those interested in arts and crafts, Beaded Thursday returns on September 10. Bring your beading or another craft project to work on. While the sessions aren't formal classes, participants can share ideas, ask questions, and learn techniques from one another. The library will also continue its monthly Tech Tuesdays, offering technology classes on a variety of topics throughout the year.

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NEW CAMPUS SIGNS IMPROVE WAYFINDING AND SAFETY

As part of our strategic planning efforts at Blackfeet Community College, we have made campus safety, efficiency, and creating a welcoming experience for our students, faculty, staff, and community a priority.

One of the ways we are putting this into action is through our new building signs, now installed at most of our campus buildings.

We wanted to make it easier for students and visitors to find classrooms, labs, offices, and services without the confusion or delays that can come with navigating a campus. Our BFCC Marketing Committee worked to create a modern, custom signage system that supports accessibility and inclusion while also reflecting who we are as a college.

Each sign features the Blackfeet Nation's Rocky Mountain Front, along with the building's Blackfeet name and English translation. We wanted our signage to not only help people find their way, but also reflect our connection to our land, language, and identity.

The signs also feature QR codes that provide quick access to each building's emergency response map and online directory, helping students, staff, and visitors locate departments and important safety information.

For us, these signs are more than just a way to find a building. They are part of creating a campus that feels organized, welcoming, safe, and distinctly BFCC.

As we continue improving our campus, we are proud to make changes that strengthen the experience for everyone who learns, works, and visits here.

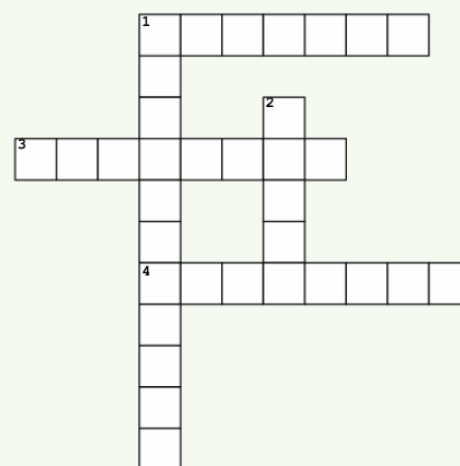
