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## BFCC AND GLACIER NATIONAL PARK FORGE HISTORIC PARTNERSHIP AT BEAR RIVER COMMEMORATION

On January 21-22, 2025, Blackfeet Community College (BFCC) will host its annual Bear River Commemoration on the BFCC campus, themed "A People Still Standing, A Culture Still Speaking." The event will feature insightful presentations from Blackfoot Confederacy scholars, a community art show, activities for local youth, and, on the morning of January 22, an historic signing of a memorandum of agreement between the college and Glacier National Park (GNP). The full event agenda is available on the BFCC website.

This MOA is the start of an intentional, collaborative relationship between BFCC and GNP to foster mutual educational, cultural, and professional benefits to partners. BFCC President Brad Hall said, "The college is a key resource for community-based knowledge; this partnership will be an important step in providing homeland access for community healing, advancing the park as a source of traditional ecological knowledge, and furthering partnerships to advance student success and community engagement initiatives at the college."

The agreement also will promote park access through educational programming, support professional development for park staff, and enable the hosting of college-sponsored, cultural events within the park. "It's an honor to be a part of strengthening connections between the college and the park and supporting Blackfeet culture and learning in Glacier National Park," said GNP Superintendent Dave Roemer. "This agreement furthers the Department of Interior's goal of supporting tribal sovereignty and traditions." The college is excited to welcome Brian Carlstrom, the acting 6, 7, and 8 regional director for the National Park Service to sign the MOA.

The college will also honor leaders of the Glacier Park Conservancy, which donated \$100,000 to the college in 2024 to construct BFCC's native plant nursery.



This greenhouse will serve as a learning and growing center for culturally significant plant species to support research and restoration projects. Construction is set to be completed later in 2026.

## ROOTED IN COMMUNITY, RISING IN STEM: THE GUERRERO-GOBERT SISTERS' JOURNEY FROM BFCC TO ENGINEERING CAREERS

Blackfeet Community College has long been a place where students find their footing, build confidence, and begin pathways that reach far beyond campus. Few stories reflect that impact more powerfully than that of the Guerrero-Gobert sisters, Alicia, Kaylanna, Juliana, and Latesha, whose shared journey into STEM and engineering began at BFCC and continues today at Montana State University.

Recently highlighted in Montana State University's Mountains and Minds feature, "The Montana Girls," the sisters' story is one of family, perseverance, and purpose. Three of the sisters, Alicia, Kaylanna, and Juliana, began their higher education journeys at Blackfeet Community College, where Alicia and Juliana were named co-valedictorians in 2024, an achievement that speaks to both their dedication and the strong academic foundation built at BFCC.

### A Shared Path, Strengthened by Sisterhood

For the Guerrero-Gobert sisters, pursuing STEM has never been a solitary experience. Supporting one another academically and emotionally has been central to their success.

"Doing school together makes us push each other to do better," Kaylanna shared. Now pursuing her bachelor's degree in Environmental Engineering at MSU, she credits her sisters as a constant support system, helping talk through concerns, work through challenging coursework, and remind each other that success is possible, even in moments of doubt.

Juliana, who earned her Pre-Engineering Associate degree at BFCC and is now completing her Bachelor's in Biological Engineering at MSU, echoed that sentiment. Engineering, she explained, can feel isolating, but having sisters to study with,

tutor one another, and lean on made all the difference. Latesha, the youngest sister and now pursuing Mechanical Engineering, reflected on how early that influence began. "Juliana taught me my times tables on the school bus when I was in first grade," she said. "Seeing her succeed at BFCC broke down the mental barriers of pursuing engineering and gave me the confidence to chase this path."



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## Starting Close to Home at BFCC

Each sister's decision to attend Blackfeet Community College was shaped by different circumstances, but all found the same result: a supportive, encouraging environment that made higher education feel attainable.

For Alicia, BFCC offered reassurance at a time when she needed it most. Encouraged by Kaylanna and supported by caring staff, she found solutions to financial concerns through work-study opportunities and scholarships. "The staff were so lovely," she said. "They made sure to seek out solutions."

Kaylanna's journey to BFCC came during a period of upheaval. After her family moved back to Browning during the pandemic, she enrolled at BFCC on the final day of registration. Though shy and nervous, she soon found encouragement in every classroom. "All the instructors at BFCC are very encouraging and supportive," she said. "Eventually, I was more comfortable and happy being there."

Juliana chose BFCC because it allowed her to stay close to family while beginning her college journey. "I was scared to leave home," she shared. "BFCC staff were very encouraging, which made me sure of my choice."

## Building Confidence, Academically and Personally

At BFCC, the sisters gained far more than credits, they built confidence.

Alicia credits BFCC with helping her overcome fear and self-doubt after an earlier experience at a larger university. "It felt like a new extension of family," she said. "They were all cheering me on." That foundation made transferring to MSU not only possible, but successful.

Juliana reflected on how BFCC prepared her both academically and personally, from public speaking and building relationships with instructors, to grounding her education in Blackfeet history, language, and research. She named classes in math, chemistry, history, language, and science research as instrumental in her growth.

Across their stories, instructors and advisors played a critical role. Pam Atkins' encouragement, Shannon Salois' math instruction, Dr. Leanne Zainer's research mentorship, Betty Henderson-Matthews' history classes, and experiential learning opportunities all helped the sisters see themselves as capable engineers.

One standout experience was attending the AIHEC Conference, encouraged by BFCC staff. There, the sisters presented research, met Native STEM professionals from across the country, and deepened their cultural connections. "It gave us the confidence to be Native engineers," Juliana said.

## Carrying Blackfeet Identity into STEM Spaces

As Blackfeet women in engineering, the sisters carry a strong sense of responsibility and pride.

"Being away from home is hard," Alicia shared. "But I want to be

a good representation of my community in spaces where there are hardly any Natives, and even fewer Blackfeet."

Latesha added that many challenges facing the reservation require solutions rooted in lived understanding. "I wanted the knowledge behind creating sustainable solutions back home," she said. "Blackfeet have always been engineers, I'm just following the path others have paved."

## Looking Ahead and Back Home

All three sisters share a common goal: to return home and give back.

Juliana hopes to bring her education back to the reservation to help improve the community. Alicia plans to pursue graduate education before returning home. Kaylanna looks forward to using her degree to contribute to her people and inspire future BFCC students to continue their education.

Their advice to current BFCC students is both honest and encouraging: transferring can be uncomfortable, STEM is challenging, and the journey isn't linear, but remembering who you are, where you come from, and why you started makes all the difference.

Through their achievements, the Guerrero-Gobert sisters embody the mission of Blackfeet Community College: strengthening students through education rooted in community, culture, and possibility. Their journey stands as a powerful reminder that big futures can, and do – begin right here at BFCC.

These internships offer real-world research experience that strengthens university and graduate school applications while building leadership, technical, and professional skills. Interns contribute to projects that support food security, cultural knowledge, and environmental stewardship in the community. Who Can Apply: BFCC students with a 2.0 GPA or higher, especially those in science-related programs. Applicants submit a one-page statement of interest and a temporary employment application.

Expectations: Ability to work outdoors, lift up to 50 lbs, communicate effectively, and commit to assigned projects.

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## BEAR RIVER COMMEMORATION: A GATHERING OF KNOWLEDGE, REMEMBRANCE, AND PARTNERSHIP

The 2026 Bear River Commemoration at Blackfeet Community College brought together students, elders, educators, and community members for two meaningful days centered on learning, remembrance, and the continued strength of the Piikani People.

The commemoration opened on January 21 with an impactful presentation by Dr. Reggie Crow Shoe, who shared teachings rooted in traditional knowledge and modern-day leadership. Drawing from his book *Aka'tsiman*, Dr. Crow Shoe spoke about transformational leadership and the importance of gathering in intentional ways, how we sit together, define roles, communicate clearly, and motivate one another through shared responsibility. His presentation set a thoughtful and grounded tone for the days that followed.

The day continued with BFCC's monthly Elders Lunch, where 185 community members, students and BFCC staff were fed. It was sponsored by the Knowledge Carriers Lodge, where elders gathered in a space filled with conversation, reflection, and shared wisdom, reminding all present of the importance of honoring lived knowledge and community voices.

On January 22, the commemoration continued with a historic moment for the College, the signing of a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between Blackfeet Community College and the U.S. Department of the Interior (Glacier National Park). The ceremony included remarks from Dr. Brad Hall, President of BFCC, and leadership from the National Park Service, marking a meaningful step forward in partnership.

Throughout the day, the campus welcomed youth from Ms. Burd's first grade immersion class, who participated in a wide range of educational and cultural activities. Youth presenters included Brandon Fish leading traditional games; Taos Yellow Owl offering sign language instruction; Robert Hall sharing language teachings; Treyace Yellow Owl leading pemmican making; Jeff Daiter presenting a screenplay during a lunchtime screening; and Justine Momberg sharing Native science through the Native Science Field Centers.

A descendant presentation by Laverne Wells offered a moving reflection on the descendants of Bear River Massacre survivors, grounding the commemoration in lived history and remembrance.

Author presentations by Lea Whitford, Carol Murray, and Mark Ratledge were a meaningful highlight of the day. Lea and Carol read excerpts from their book, sharing the beginnings of their journey researching the Bear River Massacre. They spoke about the responsibility, care, and commitment involved in documenting survivor stories and honoring the truth of what took place.

An accompanying art show in the BFCC Library featured works by local artists, adding a creative and reflective space that complemented the conversations and teachings shared throughout the commemoration.

The Bear River Commemoration continues to serve as a space where history is honored, voices are lifted, and community gathers. Ensuring that remembrance, learning, and resilience carry forward to future generations.



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## KNOWLEDGE CARRIERS LODGE: A PLACE FOR ELDERS, LEARNING, AND COMMUNITY

The Knowledge Carriers Lodge (KCL) at Blackfeet Community College provides a socially welcoming and supportive space for community knowledge carriers—elders and eminent scholars of the Blackfeet Nation. The Lodge connects elders with community-based services and resources while creating opportunities for them to participate in and contribute to BFCC programs and campus life.

At the heart of the Lodge is a commitment to care, respect, and relationship-building. KCL staff create a safe and hospitable environment where elders are welcomed with patience, dignity, and understanding, ensuring they have a place on campus where they feel supported and valued.

### Ongoing Community Programs

Throughout the Spring 2026 semester, the Knowledge Carriers Lodge will host ongoing events that bring together elders, students, and community partners in meaningful ways.

Monthly Elders Lunches, held in partnership with the Blackfeet Domestic Violence Program and Eagle Shields, provide meals, activities, and informational sessions.

### Scheduled events include:

- February 18: Medicaid and Medicare information
- March 25: Wills and Probate information
- April 15: Honorary Council and Youth Council Q&A
- May 20: Family History activity

During Elders Lunches, the Lodge also offers giveaways of practical supplies that support elders in daily life, including oxygen readers, shower handles, reacher tools, walkers, and other helpful items.

In addition, KCL hosts Koopii (Soup) Tuesdays, offering soup to students, staff, and the public, and Craft Wednesdays, where participants engage in hands-on cultural projects. Past craft activities have included making moccasins and cradle boards, fostering intergenerational learning and cultural knowledge sharing.



### Picture Book Award


The winner for best Picture Book is "Chooch Helped" written by Andrea L. Rogers (Cherokee Nation) illustrated by Rebecca Lee Kunz (Cherokee Nation) and published by Arthur A. Levine, an imprint of Levine Querido.

Sissy's younger brother, Chooch, isn't a baby anymore. They just celebrated his second birthday, after all. But no matter what Chooch does – even if he's messing something up! Which is basically all the time! – their parents say he's just "helping." Sissy feels that Chooch can get away with anything!




### Middle Grade Award

The winner for best Middle Grade book is "Buffalo Dreamer" written by Violet Duncan (Plains Cree and Taino from Kehewin Cree Nation) and published by Nancy Paulsen Books, an imprint of Penguin Random House. Summer and her family always spend relaxed summers in Alberta, Canada, on the reservation where her mom's family lives. But this year is turning out to be an eye-opening one. First, Summer has begun to have vivid dreams in which she's running away from one of the many real-life residential schools that tore Native children from their families and tried to erase their Native identities.



### Young Adult Award

The winner for best Young Adult book is "Legendary Frybread Drive-In: Intertribal Stories," edited by Cynthia Leitich Smith (Muscogee Nation), and published by Heartdrum, an imprint of HarperCollins Publishers. The road to Sandy June's Legendary Frybread Drive-In slips through every rez and alongside every urban Native hangout. The menu offers a rotating feast, including traditional eats and tasty snacks. But Sandy June's serves up more than food: it hosts live music, movie nights, unexpected family reunions, love long lost, and love found again. That big green-and-gold neon sign beckons to teens of every tribal Nation, often when they need it most.



### About the American Indian Library Association

The American Indian Library Association is a membership action group that addresses the library-related needs of American Indians and Alaska Natives. Members are individuals and institutions interested in the development of programs to improve library cultural and informational services in school, public, and academic libraries. AILA is committed to disseminating information about Indian cultures, languages, values and traditions to the library community.

Aaron LaFromboise has been a member of AILA since 2012, is a past president (2022), and has served on the Executive Board from 2015-2023. 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## IN LOVING MEMORY OF ROBERT J. TAILFEATHERS

Student Advocate, Mentor, Artist, and Friend

Robert J. Tailfeathers, known to all as Bob, served Blackfeet Community College for nearly 30 years, leaving behind a legacy defined by compassion, leadership, creativity, and an unwavering commitment to students.

Bob began his journey at BFCC in 1987 as Director of Academic Enrichment Services, where he led Academic Enrichment and Montana TRIO programs and worked tirelessly to support student success. In 1992, he became Dean of Student Services, a role he held until 2011.

Throughout his leadership, Bob was deeply respected for his professionalism, inclusiveness, and ability to handle even the most difficult situations with humor, calm, and care. Students trusted him completely, because he never abandoned them.

A devoted advisor to Student Senate, Bob believed students deserved a seat at every table. He brought Student Senate to Board of Trustees meetings, ensured students were informed and prepared, and equipped them to represent BFCC at the national level through AIHEC. Under his mentorship, the college became one of the top-performing institutions at AIHEC, a reflection of his belief in student leadership and empowerment. Former student Angela Johnson, who remembered how Bob had a way of uniting everyone with ease: "We all became Student Senate because of what kind of leader he was."

Bob was instrumental in launching the college's basketball team and organizing countless student activities and tournaments that brought energy and connection to campus life. As Senior Administrator and Student Activities Director from 2011 to 2016, he continued to build programs that strengthened student engagement and belonging. Beyond his administrative roles, Bob was an artist and cultural contributor. He created artwork for teams, posters, and campus organizations, donated pieces to support fundraisers, published comics in the newspaper, and practiced traditional quill work. Known as a practical joker, Bob used laughter to ease tension and bring people together, his personality was one of his greatest gifts. Above all, Bob had a rare ability to connect with people. If a student had an idea, Bob found a way to make it happen, including them in the process so they gained confidence, experience, and skills for the future. He built strong teams, fostered collaboration effortlessly, and modeled what student services should look like at Blackfeet Community College.

Bob's legacy lives on in the students he mentored, the programs he built, the art he shared, and the community he helped strengthen. He will be deeply missed and always remembered.
