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## HEALTH & WELLNESS TAKE CENTER STAGE AT BFCC HEALTH DAY 2025

Blackfeet Community College recently hosted its annual Health Day, ISK-SKOM-MITS-KOI-STOM—a celebration and reminder to prioritize wellness, self-care, and community connection.

This year's event was a vibrant success, with several hundred attendees taking part in a full day of health-focused activities. More than 80 presenters and organizations generously shared their time, services, and expertise, offering everything from health screenings and wellness resources to cultural practices that support healing and balance.

The day also featured the BFCC Open House, giving participants a chance to explore academic programs and sign up for upcoming classes—blending the journey toward better health with opportunities for personal and educational growth.

The registration table welcomed 754 people throughout the day, and activity booths recorded over 900 individual visits—showing strong participation from students, families, and community members.

Visitors enjoyed interactive booths, traditional foods, raffles, and live demonstrations that added energy and cultural richness to the event. The presence of elders, youth, and wellness professionals made it a truly intergenerational gathering centered on healing and support. Conversations sparked throughout the day have already led to follow-up workshops and new partnerships in motion.

Their ongoing partnership with BFCC brings together a network of local service providers and advocates committed to uplifting the community through wellness and cultural resilience.

### AFFIRMING OUR HISTORY: NATIVE CURRICULUM IS A SOVEREIGN RIGHT

At Blackfeet Community College, teaching Blackfeet history, language, and culture isn't just an academic choice—it's a reflection of our sovereignty and a recognition of our responsibility to future generations. Our curriculum is built on the understanding that Native knowledge systems belong at the center of education, especially for Native students.

Recent national dialogue around Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) policies has caused concern at many tribal colleges, where essential programs have been at risk due to misclassification. While we welcome clarification from federal education leaders affirming that Native history is not DEI—but a sovereign right—we know that words must be backed by continued support and resources. President Brad Hall of BFCC expressed cautious optimism following recent statements from the U.S. Department of Education. "It's good to see recognition of our unique status," he said. "But what we need now is action—assured funding, restored protections, and meaningful inclusion of tribal perspectives in policy decisions." BFCC remains committed to providing an education that honors our stories, revitalizes our language, and strengthens our community.

This annual gathering brings together Blackfoot scholars, students, and community members from across the region and beyond to share ideas, research, and projects that uplift and preserve Blackfoot knowledge systems.

The conference features a wide range of presentations centered on cultural resilience, language revitalization, Indigenous education, Blackfoot-led health initiatives, and community-based research. Topics include early childhood education models rooted in Niitsitapi values, Blackfoot STEM education, traditional equine programs, and innovative approaches to decolonizing academic spaces and research practices. In addition to panel presentations and breakout sessions, attendees will experience documentary screenings, poster exhibits, and opportunities to connect with educators, health professionals, and fellow community advocates. This event highlights the ongoing work of Blackfoot thinkers and creators who are building strong futures grounded in cultural strength and academic excellence.

The conference is free and open to the public. All sessions will be recorded and preserved through the Blackfeet Archives at the Medicine Spring Library and the Blackfeet Community College YouTube channel to ensure ongoing access for future generations.
